Were you one of the 1.3 million Aussie school kids who sat the NAPLAN tests earlier this year?

Then you're also probably one of the 1.3 million who received their results this week at school - and have had a chance to see where your black dot hovers on the the scales that measure how good we are as a nation of young readers, writers, and mathematicians.

Did you do ok? Good for you! Do you think maybe you could have done better? Well - that's the nature of exams, my friends.

And according to reports: you're in good company - with experts yesterday saying that one in three students failed basic tests of reading and writing.

Finding commas and recognising verbs was reportedly a big problem for many students with education experts now poring over the results to work out how to lift the results in the future.

And it turns out that where you live makes a difference to how well you performed - with kids in the cities generally doing better than kids in the country. And Indigenous kids doing three times worse than non-Indigenous Aussie students.

And girls: according to NAPLAN, you're better at writing than boys - though boys appear to have outperformed girls when it comes to maths.

And remember: as we always say here at Squiz Kids ... it's just a test. It doesn't measure how creative you are, or how good a sports player or dancer or painter you are .. or, for that matter, how kind you are. Because that's the real test we should all be trying to pass every day ..

You see: cane toads have become such a problem across the Top End, that crocs have been eating them and in many cases, dying because of the cane toad poison.

So clever scientists have been teaching crocs not to eat cane toads - by cooking them up, removing their poison sac, injecting a bit of a chemical that makes the crocs feel a bit sick after eating the cane toad carcass - enough so that the next time they come across a live one, they don't eat it.

It's all about maintaining the delicate balance in the local ecosystem. So clever! Cane toad casserole anyone? No thanks!
