THE LOWDOWN

As this podcast goes to air this morning, let's take a moment to think about the people of Florida, a state in the southeast United States. Florida is mostly a peninsula, which means that it sticks out into the ocean, surrounded by water on three sides. I've stuck a link to a map of Florida in your episode notes if you want to check it out

Right now, a massive storm called Hurricane Milton is hitting Florida's coastline It's one of the biggest storms people can remember, with winds up to 300 kilometres and hour - wowsers! This type of storm is called a Category Five hurricane, the strongest there is. We've done a Shortcut to Cyclones, Hurricanes and Typhoons, if you want to learn more about these tropical giants, there's a link to listen in the episode notes.

You might remember from last week's podcast that the poor people of Florida are only just starting to clean up after Hurricane Helene, with 300 dump trucks removing thousands of tonnes of debris, and now they're facing another challenge.

Almost six million people have been ordered to leave their homes as damaging winds, storm surges of ocean water up to five metres high and more than 60 centimetres of rainfall threaten to flatten and flood homes and cut off power and road access for days if not weeks.

Squiz Kids' thoughts are with you, Florida. We hope you stay safe!

Meanwhile, back home here in Australia, the summer storm season has kicked off with a bang! Queensland and New South Wales are getting hit with some serious thunderstorm action this week—think strong winds, huge hailstones, and rain coming down in buckets. To make sure you're ready for it, the Bureau of Meteorology has alerts that adults can sign up for using their weather app.

And hey, if you've got a dog who turns into a big scaredy-pup at the sound of thunder (I'm looking at you, fluffy friends!), you might want to keep them safe inside where it's a little less scary. Stay dry, everyone!

SPIN THE GLOBE

Each day, we give the world globe a spin and find a news story from wherever it stops, and today, we've landed in Lebanon, a country to the north of Israel, where nearly 4,000 Aussies have asked the Australian Government for help to get back home.

Lebanon has been caught up in the fighting between Israel and a group called Hezbollah, making it a dangerous place for both the people who live there and Australians who are visiting. You might be surprised to learn that around half a million Australians have Lebanese heritage, so it's possible you know someone with family connections to the country.

To help those who need to return, the Australian Government has been organising special flights to bring them home. There were plenty of hugs and happy tears at Sydney Airport earlier this week when the first 350 people arrived safely. While it's been a tough time for many, it's heartwarming to see families reunited and people coming home to safety.

ANIMAL KINGDOM

We've covered some serious stories today, so now it's time for... Fat Bear Week! Our favourite time of year at Squiz Kids HQ, where we watch the bears of Katmai National Park in Alaska stuff themselves silly with salmon to fatten up for winter hibernation. Both are everywhere on the internet: which is why we always have to do as Squiz-E tells us - and that's STOP, THINK and CHECK before believing everything we see.
