THE LOWDOWN

We're blasting off into space in *The Lowdown* today with NASA's Europa Clipper, the largest robotic probe it's ever built! Its mission? To explore one of the most mysterious places in our solar system—Europa, one of Jupiter's moons. Scientists think this icy moon may have a vast ocean beneath its frozen surface.

Could that mean life? Well, NASA's \$5 billion mission, which has been decades in the making, aims to find out. The probe will take five and a half years to travel 2.9 billion kilometres to reach Europa, getting a gravity boost from Mars and Earth to slingshot it out toward Jupiter.

Once it arrives, the Europa Clipper will stick around for four years, making 49 fly-bys and coming as close as 25 kilometres from the surface, studying the moon for signs that it might have what's needed to support simple life, like bacteria - sadly probably not fish or whales say scientists.

Meanwhile, SpaceX made history on Sunday with another jaw-dropping achievement! During a test flight of its Starship rocket, the massive first-stage booster—the bit that launches the rocket with all the fire and gas—carried the second stage 70 km above Earth. But here's the cool part: instead of crashing, the booster flew itself back to the launch pad, where giant mechanical arms caught it in mid-air! It landed perfectly in the launch tower's arms.

This new catch-and-land trick is a huge step towards reusable rockets that could one day take humans to the Moon—and even Mars. There's an amazing video of the landing, and trust me, it's out of this world!

SPIN THE GLOBE

Each day, we give the world globe a spin and find a news story from wherever it stops. And today, we've landed in England. Specifically Cambridge University's Museum of Zoology, where something a little bizarre is happening. People are... talking to the animals! And no, Dr Dolittle isn't running the show (ask your parents if you haven't heard of him!). Here's the twist—these animals are long gone, kicked the bucket... dead. But thanks to AI, for the next month, 20 different animals, whether they're stuffed or skeletons, have been given the power of speech!

Using their phones, museum visitors can chat with creatures from a fin whale to a dodo in over 20 different languages. The idea behind the program is to forge a closer connection between humans and animals to try and stop future extinctions. Want to know what a dodo ate for lunch before humans wiped it out? Just ask! Wonder what life was like for the fin whale in the open ocean? It'll tell you. And yes, the platypus speaks with an Aussie accent—how cool is that?

There's even an American cockroach in the exhibit. I wonder if I'd still squish it if it could argue back.

Despite the chaos, the Socceroos managed to hold Japan to a one-all draw. But here's the kicker—neither team scored a proper goal! Both points were own goals, meaning they accidentally kicked the ball into their *own* nets.

Going into the match, the Aussies were the underdogs, facing a red-hot Japan team sitting pretty at the top of their qualifying group. And to make things tougher, the Socceroos had never beaten the Samurai Blue on Japanese soil, with their last win against them way back in 2009.
